3 **Section 3. Area of Application.**

4 This Chapter shall be enforceable within the area in which the Director enforces any State
5 statute order, quarantine, rule, regulation or ordinance relating to public or environmental health,
6 including incorporated as well as unincorporated territory. (Ord. 640.4 § 3, 1997)

7 **Section 4. Exception to Area of Application.**

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9 Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 4.52.030, any provision of this Chapter which is
10 duplicated in scope by a valid municipal ordinance shall not be applicable in the incorporated
11 territory affected by such municipal ordinance. (Ord. 640.4 § 4, 1997)

12 **Section 5. Separate Activities.**

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14 Except as to vending machines and certain hazardous materials management activities, if a
15 person shall conduct more than one of the activities for which a receipt is required, that person shall
16 obtain a separate receipt for each such activity. (Ord. 640.4 § 5, 1997)

17 **Section 6. Period of Receipt.**

18 A receipt issued under this Chapter may be issued at any time during the year. All such
19 receipts shall expire annually on the one year anniversary of the date of issuance, except for the
20 following:

- 21 A. A receipt for Certificate of Competency relating to the inspection of a backflow prevention
22 device, which receipt shall be valid for a period of three years from its issuance and shall
23 expire the thirtieth day of September of the third year.
- 24 B. A receipt relating to a temporary food facility or occasional event which receipt shall be
25 valid for no longer than twenty-five (25) or three days respectively in a ninety (90) day
26 period from the effective date of such receipt, as evidenced thereon.

- 1 C. A receipt relating to a vending machine, mobile food facility, mobilehome park,
2 recreational vehicle park, incidental camping area, shall be valid until the thirty-first day of
3 December of the calendar year in which such receipt is issued.
- 4 D. A receipt relating to a temporary recreational vehicle park which receipt shall be valid for
5 eleven (11) days from the effective date of such receipt, as evidenced thereon.
- 6 E. If an initial application for a liquid waste hauler or medical waste generator receipt is made
7 after the first three months of the calendar year, the fee shall be calculated on a pro rated
8 basis by quarter of the year and shall be rounded off to the nearest dollar.
- 9 F. A receipt for the annual operating permit for public water systems, State Small Water
10 Systems or Labor Camp Water Systems shall be valid from July 1st, to June 30th of each
11 fiscal year. (Ord. 640.4 § 6, 1997)

12 **Section 7. Delinquency Dates and Penalties.**

- 13 A. The delinquency date shall be, in the case of an initial application, the thirty-first day after
14 commencement of the activity except as to the following:
- 15 1. Temporary food facility or occasional event, in which case the receipt specified in
16 this Ordinance shall be delinquent if not obtained earlier than ten working days prior
17 to the day such activity is commenced;
- 18 2. Temporary closure of an underground storage tank which shall comply with the
19 requirements as contained in Chapter 8.140, (Ordinance 617);
- 20 B. The delinquency date shall be, in the case of renewal, the thirtieth day following the
21 expiration date shown on the receipt.
- 22 C. Except as provided in Subsection (A)(1) and (2) of this Section, the delinquency date of a
23 temporary receipt issued pursuant to this Chapter shall be the second day after the
24 commencement of the activity.
- 25 D. If any fee specified is not paid prior to the delinquency date, the applicant shall pay, in
26 addition to such fee, a penalty in the amount of twenty (20) percent of such fee; if any fee
27 specified is not paid within thirty (30) days of the delinquency date, the applicant shall pay
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1 in addition to such fee, a penalty in the amount of one hundred (100) percent of such fee,
2 except as to the following:

3 1. If the fee specified in this Chapter for a mobile home park, recreational vehicle park,
4 incidental camping area is not paid prior to the delinquency date, the penalties for
5 delinquency shall be as follows:

6 a. If such fees are paid on or after the first day of February and prior to the first day
7 of March of the applicable calendar year, the applicant shall pay, in addition to
8 the fee specified in Section 4.52.130, a penalty of the amount of ten (10) percent
9 of such fee.

10 b. If such fees are paid on or after the first day of March of the applicable calendar
11 year, the applicant shall pay, in addition to the fee specified in Section 4.52.130, a
12 penalty in the amount of one hundred (100) percent of such fee. (Ord. 640.4 § 7,
13 1997)

14 **Section 8. Temporary Receipts.**

15 If the applicant for a receipt shows, to the satisfaction of the Director, that because an activity
16 is of a seasonal nature, or because of statutory or ordinance regulations, or because of termination
17 or loss of lease, or because of acquisition by the public of the premises on which the activity is
18 situated, or because of similar reasons which are adequately documented, such activity can only be
19 carried on for a limited period of time, not to exceed three-quarters of a year, a temporary receipt
20 may be issued for such period and the fee shall be calculated on a pro rata basis by quarters of the
21 year and rounded off to the nearest dollar amount. (Ord. 640.4 § 8, 1997)

22 **Section 9. Receipt Applications.**

23 Applications for receipts shall be filed with the Department on a form to be provided by the
24 Department. Completed applications shall be accompanied by the required fee and penalty, if any.
25 Unless otherwise provided in this chapter, such fees shall not be refundable. (Ord. 640.4 § 9, 1997)
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1 **Section 10. Transfer of Receipt.**

2 A. No receipt issued pursuant to this Chapter shall be transferable unless a transfer fee for such
3 receipt is provided as required in Section 4.52.130.

4 B. Where a receipt issued pursuant to this Chapter is transferable, such transfer may be
5 accomplished upon application to the Department therefore such transfer application shall
6 be made on a form provided by the Department and the completed application shall be
7 accompanied by the required transfer fee as provided in Section 4.52.130. (Ord. 640.4 § 10,
8 1997)

9 **Section 11. Posting of Receipt.**

10 Every person having a valid receipt issued pursuant to this Chapter shall post such receipt in
11 a conspicuous place selected by the Director, showing the appropriate fees have been paid. (Ord.
12 640.4 § 11, 1997)

13 **Section 12. Posting of Permit.**

14 Every person issued a valid permit pursuant to this Chapter shall post the permit in a
15 conspicuous place selected by the Director. The permit may be revoked by the Director for a
16 facility's noncompliance with County, State and Federal laws and regulations. (Ord. 640.4 § 12,
17 1997)

18 **Section 13. Required Fees.**

19 No person, corporation, association, firm, business or entity shall operate, perform, carry on,
20 conduct or engage in any of the activities delineated in this Section without paying the fee listed in
21 this section for the activity and obtaining a receipt therefore from the Department of Environmental
22 Health.

25 “Community Event” meets the following provisions, a discount as outlined
26 below will be applied to food vendors operating at the event and the “Event
27 Organizer Permit” fee will be waived:
28 Provide the Department with a complete list of all food vendors, which will

1 operate at the event at least two weeks prior to the start of the event. The list
 2 must include the owners name, business name, address, telephone number and
 3 category of operation as listed above, for each food vendor.

4 Pay in full all permit fees required by this Department for each food vendor at
 5 least two weeks prior to the start of the event.

6 Food vendors found at the Community Event that were not included on the list
 7 provided by the Event Organizer will not receive the discounted rate.

8 **Section 14. Violations--Penalties.**

9 **A. Infractions.**

10 Any person who violates any of the provisions of this chapter shall be guilty of an infraction
11 and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by: (1) a fine not less than fifty dollars (\$50.00) or to
12 exceed one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for a first violation of this chapter; (2) a fine not less than one
13 hundred dollars (\$100.00) or to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for a second violation of this
14 chapter within one year; (3) a fine not less than three hundred dollars (\$300.00) or to exceed five
15 hundred dollars (\$500.00) for each additional violation of this chapter after a second violation
16 within one year.

17 **B. Misdemeanor.**

18 Notwithstanding the foregoing in subsection A of this section, a first and subsequent offense
19 may be charged and prosecuted as a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished as
20 provided by Penal Code, Section 19 as amended. Each day such violation is committed or
21 permitted to continue shall constitute a separate offense.

22 **C. Correction of Violations.**

23 Payment of any penalty established by this chapter shall not relieve a person from
24 responsibility of correcting any violation of this chapter, statute or regulation nor shall it relieve a
25 person from the payment of a late fee imposed under this chapter. (Ord. 640.4 § 14, 1997)
